SUBJECT: Outreach and Temporary Shelter Services (Revised)

Under advisement from the April 21, 2020, Board of Supervisors meeting (Item No. 11), this memorandum summarizes Valley Homeless Healthcare Program's (VHHP) efforts to assist sheltered and unsheltered homeless men, women and families during the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, the memorandum summarizes countywide efforts to improve coordination, increase temporary shelter capacity and increase services for unsheltered persons. This version of the memorandum supersedes the one submitted earlier and includes two attachments.

VHHP Services

VHHP has dedicated one Mobile Medical Unit (MMU) and two Backpack Medicine teams to provide medical, behavioral health and outreach services at congregate shelters, at non-congregate shelter sites and to unsheltered homeless persons. A physician, a nurse, and an outreach worker/driver staff the MMU, which rotates throughout the week to various congregate shelter sites. Additionally, three telehealth physicians perform daily or weekly wellness checks for individuals staying at congregate and non-congregate shelter sites.

Each Backpack Medicine team consists of a medical provider, a nurse, and a community health outreach specialist. Carrying backpacks filled with medicines and medical equipment, the team provides health care services to unsheltered men and women, wherever they might be, such as in the streets, along waterways or near railroad tracks. The teams also screen individuals for COVID-19 symptoms and collect specimens for COVID-19 testing when needed. While the physician and nurse are providing the medical care, the community outreach specialist educates individuals about COVID-19 and how to reduce the risk of transmission including proper hand washing and maintaining proper distancing. The community outreach specialist also distributes hygiene kits that include water, soap, hand sanitizer and snacks.

If there is a reported positive case(s) at a shelter, multiple Backpack Medicine teams or the MMU are deployed to screen and test staff and residents in order to identify and immediately isolate the affected persons.

Between March 19, 2020, and May 7, 2020, VHHP staff made 67 visits to 37 different sites, screened 752 people, and tested 151 people for COVID-19 (see Attachment A). Once a week, the County's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) will prepare and distribute a report summarizing VHHP's outreach activities. The report will include outreach and other services to unsheltered persons that are being coordinated through the Joint Departmental Operations Center (JDOC).

Coordination

Building on long-standing partnerships, the County, the City of San José ("City"), and Continuum and Care partners quickly convened daily and weekly meetings to respond to the pandemic. By the end of March, the County's EOC established the JDOC to operationalize new temporary shelter programs, oversee daily temporary shelter placements and to enhance coordination between County departments, the City and partner agencies. The JDOC is comprised of staff from the County's Office of Supportive Housing (OSH), VHHP, the Behavioral Health Services Department (BHSD), a liaison from the City's Housing Department, and a representative from Destination: Home (D:H). In addition to overseeing its own temporary shelter programs, the City co-leads efforts to expand outreach and basic need services for unsheltered persons. Attachment B summarizes countywide efforts to assist unsheltered persons and increase temporary shelter capacity.

Assistance to Unsheltered Persons

The County, City, and Continuum and Care partners took immediate actions to assist unsheltered persons. These actions include:

- Suspending abatements of homeless encampments to avoid unintentionally placing people at greater risk of exposure to COVID-19;
- Encouraging individuals who remain outdoors to set up their tents/sleeping quarters 12 ft. by 12 ft. of space per individual;
- Placing hygiene equipment such as hygiene stations and portable toilets at large homeless encampments to help slow the spread of COVID-19;
- Arranging for garbage collection at large homeless encampments to help maintain sanitary conditions;
- Providing information in multiple languages to homeless individuals in shelters, on the streets, and in encampments to help them understand how they can protect themselves from COVID-19;
- Working with the County's Public Health Department and VHHP to identify older homeless individuals with chronic health conditions who should be sheltered or isolated;

- Providing 200 solar phone chargers through street outreach teams, volunteers and nonprofits;
- Distributing tents, tarps and other supplies to assist those living in encampments to implement social distancing; and,
- Launching Hope Health Mobile, which travels with Dignity on Wheels shower and laundry trailers and offers Wi-Fi charging stations, case management, and access to Stanford doctors virtually.

Temporary Housing and Shelter

The County, in coordination with the City, took immediate actions to convert existing shelter operations to 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and extend seasonal shelter operations through the shelter-in-place order. Some individuals from congregate shelters were moved to non-congregate settings and capacity at some shelters was reduced to allow for appropriate social distancing. Despite an initial reduction in shelter capacity, the County and City have vastly expanded temporary shelter capacity, adding a total of 983 additional units/beds to the temporary shelter inventory. The County and its partners continue to provide temporary shelter for every homeless individual who has tested positive or is suspected of having COVID-19. The additional temporary shelter sites include:

- 708 motel/hotel rooms across 13 sites in seven cities; and,
- 275 temporary shelter beds at the Fairgrounds Gateway Pavilion, Parkside Hall and South Hall in Downtown San José, and a family shelter at the Camden Community Center.

Since Administration's last update to the Board on April 21, the Field Respite Center (FRC) at the Santa Clara Convention Center has been closed. The FRC was able to serve up to 250 persons who were COVID-19 positive. The County and City are planning to implement an additional 459 temporary shelter beds.

To coordinate requests for and to facilitate temporary shelter placements the County established a hotline that is answered seven days a week from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
